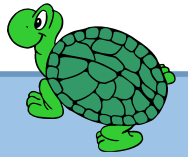

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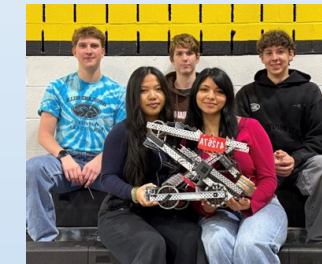
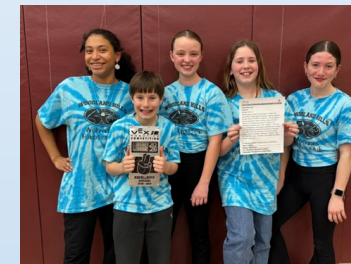

Woodland Hills Robotics Teams Turn in Strong Performances

Several Woodland Hills School District robotics teams have reached new heights this school year. At the high school level, a team nicknamed "Catalyze Robotics" earned a season-best second place finish during a VEX V5 Robotics Competition on Saturday, February 14. They followed that up a week later by posting their highest individual skill score of the season during a competition at Keystone Oaks. The skills competition challenges teams to register as many points as possible in a set time through a combination of coding and driving.

Meanwhile, on February 21, three robotics teams earned honors that qualified them for the upcoming state championships. The teams competed in the VIQRC Bash at the Berry Dome in Cranberry, Pennsylvania. "Hardwired" earned the Excellence Award, the most prestigious award of any competition, which earned them a spot in the Western Pennsylvania Middle School State Qualifiers at PennWest Clarion University in March. "IQ Pandas" won both the Team Champion Runner-Up and the Design Award, the latter of which earned them qualification to the Western Pennsylvania Elementary State Qualifier at Penn West Clarion University in March. "Robotic Wolverines" also earned the most prestigious award in a competition, the Excellence Award, that qualified them for a spot at the Western Pennsylvania Elementary State Qualifiers.
