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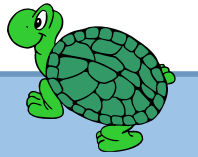
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A Fresh Chapter for a Beloved Turtle Creek Tradition!

Dan & Amy Ott, the husband-and-wife team behind Forgotten Lands, are honored to continue Henkel's legacy while bringing renewed care, energy, and ecological stewardship to the space. You'll still find the same warm faces (including AI, who will continue greeting customers for seasons to come), along with great prices and a true community spirit rooted in this valley.

Henkel's Greenhouse is now **closed for the winter** as the team prepares for spring and embark on infrastructure upgrades, but will reopen in **Spring 2026**, with the same familiar seasonal rhythm:

- **Spring Season:** Tax Day → Memorial Day
- **Fall Season:** Labor Day → Indigenous Peoples' Day

Forgotten Lands' mission is to bring life and color to overlooked and once-forgotten places — from their 25 acre restoration project just over the ridge, to the greenhouse beds that have anchored this neighborhood for a century. The Heyward House team worked with Woodland Hills High School staff over the last couple of months to make arrangements to set up a Craig's Closet location in the high school. Students who wish to utilize the clothes

available through Craig's Closet will work with school social workers Ms. Kellie Irwin and Ms. Kiersten Snyder to assess their needs. Assistant director of activities and athletics Mr. Jullian Turner will then help outfit the students with the donated clothing.

Steelers STEM Program Educates Dickson Students on STEM Careers

A trio of Woodland Hills alumni who are now working with U.S. Steel teamed up with former Steelers defensive back Mike Logan to help a group of students at Dickson Preparatory STEAM Academy learn more about STEM careers during a visit to the school on Tuesday, October 28. The alumni included Megan Muldowney, a 1999 graduate who is a Director in Supply Chain Organization for U.S. Steel; Jayson Scherrbaum, a 1993 graduate who is a maintenance manager at U.S. Steel's Clairton plant; and Mark Yezovich, a 2003 graduate who is a Shift Manager at U.S. Steel's Edgar Thomson Works in Braddock. Mr. Logan, a McKeesport native who spent ten years in the NFL and was a member of the Steelers' Super Bowl winning team in 2005, served as the moderator for the panel and the event. The students also had a chance to ask him questions about his career, and he offered advice and tips that also applied to STEM education.

The sixth and seventh graders met with representatives from U.S. Steel to ask them about their jobs and learn how Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics all play a role in their work. The visitors explained that while some of them use scientific concepts or advanced mathematics on a regular basis, others use the principals behind STEM education to help them in their careers in community outreach, management, and more. Skills like problem-solving, communication, and teamwork can be applied to any career.

Dickson teacher Ms. Karianne Lis arranged the visit through the Steelers STEM program, which is sponsored by U.S. Steel, FedEx, Shell Polymers, and Wabtec. The goal of the program is to empower students to explore STEM concepts through a variety of experiences, including classroom visits like the one on Tuesday. Ms. Lis was connected to the program through her students' use of EverFi, which offers curriculum that includes an exploration of STEM careers.
